Getting Started with Blogging

1 Pick a Style

Blog styles and blog posts vary. One of my favorite write-ups on blog styles was one done by the folks at 360 Degree Digital. Pick a set of styles that match you and your audience, and start writing!

2 Be a Facilitator

Online facilitators promote online discussion - motivate the action and interaction of bloggers and readers. Fortunately, facilitating blogs and online discussions builds on many of the same principals of facilitating face-to-face communication.

3 Monitor and Listen

A blog's success is not just about counting comments. For instance, if we step back and look at blogs as mini conference sessions, there are other ways we can evaluate blogs: attendance (readership), satisfaction, interest, and related web activity. The key is to have indicators, monitor and listen to those indicators, and then make adjustments as you go. Some blog tools have monitoring reports built in. Other tools like Google Analytics are fantastic for monitoring and listening to your readership.
